# A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

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As the Interim Director of the Patricia & Phillip Frost Art Museum at FIU, I am deeply honored to step into this role and build upon the legacy of our former director, whose leadership and dedication laid a strong foundation for the museum.

Reflecting on the 2023-24 fiscal year, our accomplishments stand as a testament to the hard work and commitment of our outstanding team. Over the past year, we proudly welcomed nearly 36,000 visitors, offering a vibrant array of exhibitions and educational programs.

Our continued success would not have been possible without the unwavering support of Florida International University, our valued members, and essential funding from Miami-Dade County, ArtBridges, Terra Foundation, Florida Humanities Council, and Funding Arts Network. Their contributions have been pivotal in driving our growth and recovery in the wake of the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The museum presented a diverse selection of exhibitions, including *Draw*, which redefined the boundaries of drawing, *Allegories for Learning*, featuring historic Italian works from the Georgia Museum of Art, and Bill Roth's contributions to the Pattern & Decoration movement. The powerful exhibitions by Sa'dia Rehman and Kacey Jeffers further added to the museum's offerings, deepening the cultural conversation and engaging our community in meaningful ways. *Of what surrounds me* highlighted three local female artists whose work explored the natural world and its influence on the creative process and was supported by The Green Family Foundation Endowment. Lastly, *The Lost Generation: Women Ceramicists and the Cuban Avant-Garde* collaboration with our FIU CasaCuba partner and Boston College created new scholarship on the contributions by Cuban women artists of the era.

Our educational programs and partnerships with Miami-Dade Public Schools supported transportation funding for more than 1,000 students and professional learning for over 400 teachers during the year. Several paid internship programs have provided students with invaluable research opportunities and hands-on experiences, while FIU faculty have further integrated museum visits into their courses. Lee Bontecou's wall sculpture, supported by ArtBridges, has been a highlight, encouraging close observation for our medical school students introducing them to visual thinking strategies.

Community engagement has remained a core value, with events like Slow Art Day—generously supported by the Venero family in memory of docent Helena Venero—offering visitors an opportunity for mindfulness and a deeper connection with art. In addition, we have continued to serve as a creative hub, hosting Open Mic Nights, zine-making workshops, Family Days, Drawing You In and Tertulia Nights, all of which have enriched our cultural impact.

Thanks to a grant from ArtBridges, we extended our hours, making the museum more accessible to the public. Membership has grown, reflecting the museum's expanding influence in South Florida, and we remain grateful for the strong support from Florida International University and our Advisory Council.

As I step into this role, I am fully committed to advancing the museum's mission and ensuring its continued growth. I sincerely appreciate the ongoing efforts and support of our team, advisory council, FIU, and our community of supporters. I look forward to the opportunities ahead with gratitude and optimism.

# EXHIBITIONS

The Frost Art Museum's exhibition program is supported by its museum members. The museum receives ongoing support from the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs and the Cultural Affairs Council, the Miami-Dade County Mayor and Board of County Commissioners.

## First-Year Reading Program Exhibitions

In 2016, the museum launched an initiative with the Common Reading Program to attract new students to the museum. All incoming students entering FIU read the same book and discuss it in their First-Year Experience course. The museum developed an exhibition to complement the book with visual literacy, and introduce students to the museum.

## MLK Exhibitions

For several years, the museum has developed an exhibition in the winter to coincide with the university's MLK Commemorative Celebration. In 2016, the museum defined the scope and goal of the exhibition, and established it formally as an exhibition series. The Martin Luther King, Jr. Exhibition series addresses issues of race, diversity, social justice, civil rights and humanity to serve as a catalyst for dialogue and enrich our community with new perspectives.

## Student Exhibitions

Annually, we host the Master of Art Education and Master of Fine Arts exhibitions.

## Draw: Point to Point

June 10 – September 10, 2023

This international initiative examines drawing as an integral part of an artist's process and challenges traditional ways of understanding the medium. Bringing together works by noted artists such as Kiki Smith, Rirkrit Tiravanija, and Tomas Vu alongside a strong representation of Miami-based artists, this exhibition will be accompanied by robust programming that encourages visitors to engage in drawing as a form of meditation and self-exploration.

## Allegories for Learning: 16th to 18th-Century Italian Works on Paper from the Georgia Museum of Art

June 10 – September 10, 2023

This exhibition showcases approximately 30 drawings and prints dating from the 16th to the 18th centuries. Selected drawings and prints represent specific artistic styles and Italian regional schools. An examination of the drawings has revealed some previously erroneous assumptions. In a few cases, new attributions have resulted; in others, authorship remains unresolved. The featured artists include Giulio Romano, Claudio Ridolfi, Palma il Giovane, Guercino, Giulio Benso, Giovanni Battista Tiepolo, Giovanni Benedetto Castiglione, Salvatore Rosa and followers of Veronese and Tintoretto.

***Embellish Me: Works from the Collection of Norma Canelas Roth and William Roth***  
 September 23, 2023 — January 7, 2024

This exhibition, presented in partnership with the Tampa Museum of Art, includes work from the collection of Norma and William Roth. Their extensive collection, much of which has never been seen before, will allow visitors to be introduced to the influential twentieth-century art movement, Pattern and Decoration and to revel in the handmade. The exhibition features paintings, prints, costumes, and mixed media. The artists include Valerie Jaudon, Joyce Kozloff, Joyce Scott, Robert Kushner, Thomas Lanigan-Schmidt, and Kim MacConnel.

***To Recognize a Pattern***  
 September 23, 2023—December 10, 2023

To Recognize a Pattern brings together works by pivotal Pattern and Decoration artists, alongside work by three contemporary artists Mark Fleuridor, Ashnide Jean-Baptiste, and Vickie Pierre. Just as the organizers of the 1977 exhibition Patterning and Decoration, sought to document “the impulse towards decoration and the delight in pattern,” Mark Fleuridor, Ashnide Jean-Baptiste, and Vickie Pierre demonstrate their commitment to intricate pattern and form, intertwined with complex content. Their work resonates with the Pattern and Decoration movement, while embracing fresh and distinctive lines of inquiry.

***Addie Herder: Machines for Living***  
 September 30, 2023 – April 14, 2024

This exhibition celebrates the dynamic small-scale abstractions of Addie Herder (1920–2009). Known for her collages, Herder’s imaginative compositions often function in between two- and three-dimensional spaces. Often through careful manipulation of found paper, the artist re-imagined form and meaning in her own intricately crafted vignettes. Herder’s rigorous yet delicate assemblage works recall the works of artists Louise Nevelson (1899–1988) and Joseph Cornell (1903–1972).

***Master of Art Education Annual Exhibition 2023***  
 December 9, 2023 – January 7, 2024

The Patricia & Phillip Frost Art Museum has featured works by students graduating from the Master of Art Education program in the College of Communication, Architecture + The Arts at Florida International University every year as part of our continuing support of FIU’s art curricula.





***You Belong Here: Place, People, and Purpose in Latinx Photography***  
January 20 – May 12, 2024

You Belong Here brings together both established artists and a new generation of emerging image-makers covering the themes of political resistance, family and community, fashion and culture, and the complexity of identity in American life. Included in this dynamic exhibition are Reynaldo Rivera's images of 1990s-era Los Angeles nightlife, Sofia Córdova's film installation about labor and collectivity, and Bibs Moreno's collaborative portraits of Gabriela Ruiz in her signature elaborate style. Joiiri Minaya remixes vintage postcards from the Dominican Republic to unveil the fantasy of tourism, and Genesis Báez crafts gestural portraits of the contemporary Puerto Rican diaspora.



***Kacey Jeffers: Multitudes***  
January 24 – May 4, 2024

Multitudes, Jeffers' first solo museum exhibition, includes different projects that were created in Nevis between 2018 and 2022. Photographs documenting the inner lives of students enrolled in 14 Nevisian schools became his 2019 series, UNIFORM. Stunning as they are introspective, Jeffers' photographs highlight the faces and bodies of the island's community as it now exists and its history as a colonized island once under British rule. Multitudes is thus an exploration of individuality—the artist's and the members of the community—and the shared experience of becoming vulnerable and exposed through the making of these images.



***Sa'dia Rehman: the river runs slow and deep and all the bones of my ancestors / have risen to the surface to knock and click like the sounds of trees in the air***  
February 3 – April 14, 2024

With this new body of work, Sa'dia Rehman begins an insistent and urgent inquiry into family histories of place while tracing exile, human intervention, and environmental crisis. The work presented also examines how a person might find themselves fastened between worlds, continents, and countries. Taking its title from a line of "My Aba's Masjid," a poem by Rehman's sister Bushra, this solo exhibition presents a selection of drawings, sculpture, textiles, works on paper, and video. It is also a culmination of Rehman's three years of working in residence with the Wexner Center's Department of Learning & Public Practice

***Master of Fine Arts Exhibition 2024, Mientras Estamos Aquí***  
April 27 – June 2, 2024

This annual exhibition allows the Frost Art Museum to celebrate the achievements of the graduating studio students in the MFA program at Florida International University. The exhibiting artists participate in diverse disciplines and address myriad subject matter. We are proud to exhibit the work of Geraldine Bello, Rebeca Lopera, Melina Tsalikis, and Diego Waisman.



***The New York Collection for Stockholm Portfolio***  
May 25, 2024 – December 8, 2024

Founded in 1958, the Moderna Museet in Stockholm has one of the world's greatest collections of modern art, and one of the strongest collections of American art in Europe. In 1973 the Swedish institution joined forces with the New York-based group, Experiments in Art and Technology (E.A.T.), to raise money for its collection. As partners, they produced a limited-edition art portfolio of 30 works by 30 artists, of which the Frost Art Museum owns one copy thanks to the donation of Mr. & Mrs. Bernard W. Gimbel in honor of Helen & Jacob Goldfinger. Noland, Claes Oldenburg, Nam June Paik, Robert Rauschenberg, Larry Rivers, James Rosenquist, George Segal, Richard Serra, Keith Sonnier, Richard Stankiewicz, Cy Twombly, Andy Warhol and Robert Whitman.

# COLLECTIONS

This past fiscal year, the Frost acquired 138 new works of art. Works by several Miami-based artists entered the collection including: Michele Oka-Doner, Gretchen Scharnagl, John Baily, Roland Woods, and Pedro Vizcaino. As well as a work by James Couper, a long-time FIU faculty member and founding director of the Frost.

Thanks to substantial donations by Jeffrey Hugh Newman and Joseph and Susan Fiorenzo, the museum acquired photographs from the *Bay/Sky* and *Provincetown* series by Joel Meyerowitz.

The Frost would also like to thank the generosity of the Beatty Estate for their donation of significant works by Antonio Enrique Amaral, Mario Bencomo, Alejandro Corujeira, and Estuardo Madonado.

Thanks to our new partnership with Museum Exchange, the Frost was able to connect with several donors and have two works donated, with more on the way! Works by Janaina Tschäpe and Kon Trubkovich are great additions to the collection. We thank Museum Exchange for their continued partnership.

With the opening of the SIPA II building on FIU's MMC campus, the museum was able to partner with the Steven Green School of International and Public Affairs to loan a grouping of our Aboriginal poles to be installed in the lobby of SIPA II, the schools new building. Additionally, Nicolas Lobo's *Silhouette of a Friend* was installed just outside Primera Casa.

## ENGAGING CAMPUS & COMMUNITY

### FACULTY

FIU Herbert Wertheim College of Medicine: Over five years, Frost has worked closely with the faculty from the Honors College in courses connecting the arts and humanities in medicine and global learning programs to introduce students to close-looking. This research-based strategy increases their observational skills.

Faculty continue to engage and support our programming aligning their course offerings to museum visits. Modern languages bring their students and honors clubs to observe, write and practice their chosen language.

The Maker Space has continued as a hub for student clubs and organizations to meet and create art based on the art on view and their investigations.

This year, we have aligned our efforts further with the FIU Freshman Experience course and the Common Reading Program. Every year Frost curates an exhibition that enables students to consider the conversations of the assigned summer reading through the lens of an artist and their artwork. Work by the artist Lee Bontecou, on loan from Art Bridges, will support the close observation exercises and Visual Thinking Strategies, and the education team will train the peer mentors from the program to enable them to guide their cohorts through the galleries effortlessly thus increasing student engagement.

## FIU STUDENTS

**Open Mic Nights** are scheduled four times per year and continue to attract students to the Frost. These creative encounters are inspired by our permanent collection exhibition. Over 150 students attended our most recent open mic experiences. Aspiring Poets, musicians, and singers performed original and popular works for their peers. This program has continued to offer a space where FIU students feel safe and encouraged to highlight their talents. Performance pieces require respect for all individuals, underscoring the university and museums values.

**Making Zines and Close Looking / Art Making** workshops support faculty from many different departments and enrolled students throughout the academic year by inviting them to create zines, small artistic publications in response to film, lecture, or reading assignments and inspired by the exhibitions on view while connecting them to the course objectives. We organize over 20 workshops per year for FIU courses and additionally many more for the community. Every workshop begins with a brief tour of the galleries and employs Visual Thinking Strategies.

# COMMUNITY

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## FIU Bring your Child to Work Day

Each year Frost organizes activities in support of FIU faculty, staff and their families to enjoy a visit to the museum with their child/children prompting them to become *Art Detectives* inviting them to engage in a museum-wide scavenger hunt designed by the education team and then rewarded with a specially made art kit to take home. This year, we invited local artists, Linda Mangual and Nicole Combeau, to explore the work of Miriam Shapiro and bookmaking.

## FIU Arts Day

Every year, the Frost team organizes a professional learning experience for the 350 teachers on campus to earn recertification points for their teaching licenses. The curatorial and education teams combine their talents and in-depth knowledge creating a workshop experience that will encourage educators to schedule field trips and support their classroom teaching with the lesson packets created for them.

## Slow Art Day: The Art of Looking and Loving Art Supported by the Venero Endowment

Every April we host Slow Art Day, a global movement that asks participants to be mindful and learn about the intersections of art and health and discover for themselves the joys of looking slowly and observing the details. Frost's unique inclusive programs intend to meet every audience's needs, including addressing the social-emotional learner needs that surfaced post-pandemic.

This year, we invited Agua Dulce Gloriosa, artist and sound healer, to perform a sound bath for our participants. She immersed the audience in vibrations while also further explaining the scientific connections between sound and the body. Smita Sen, artist and professor at Parsons School of Design, led a dance-based performance with her installation, songs to *carry with you*. In her performance, Sen weaves together visceral movement with operatic vocalizations to understand how grief and trauma are stored in the body. With the installation, Sen attempts to reimagine sites of care and create environments for the body to enter states of meditative healing.

The day's activities included a close-looking exercise with an art activity that invited visitors to write down their deepest wishes after reflecting on them, and then to capture them in a small glass bottle to carry with them.

## Family Days

The Frost organizes 4 family days per year, aligning with Haitian and Hispanic Heritage, Summer themes and current exhibitions, inviting the community for a day of reconnecting fun. Like many museums, Frost navigated the post-pandemic landscape, which would neither return to exclusive on-site experiences nor transition to only remaining virtual. We kicked off our summer programming with *Draw! From Dots to Lines* on July 15th, 2023. Participants learned and experienced introductory mark making with simple dots and ending with captivating stories. All workshops were bilingual and were led by Miami-based artist, Ismael Gomez.

For our fall programming on November 4th, 2023, we invited Miami-based artist Ashnide Jean-Baptiste, who was featured in our exhibition *To Recognize a Pattern*, to create upcycled head-dresses. The *Beats in Bloom celebrating Mothers and Others* program on May 11th, 2024 started with Dr. Katie Hart from FIU's Center for Children and Families leading a Story Time with live music. This was a great way to engage the youngest members and their parents in our audience. They ended with raffling off gift cards to parents for groceries and utilities.

Dr. Nicki Fraser, an FIU professor and Frost Advisory Board member shared her talents with the professional dancer from Florida Dance Sport who led a ballroom dancing workshop where parents and children learned dance steps to tango, the cha-cha, and bachata. Throughout the event, we offered lessons on how to make paper flowers, wish bottles, and pop-up cards, led by artist and educator, Melissa Nieto. Finally, we concluded the event with a flower bouquet-making workshop led by mother-daughter duo, *Laced with Laureles*. Participants took back home with them a personalized and whimsical bouquet to end the day.

### Community Artist Workshops

We partnered with renowned artist and FIU Professor, David Y. Chang and Miami-based artist, lead a two-part plein air watercolor workshop that brought more than 215 participants to the museum. This was inspired by our exhibition, *Allegories for Learning*.

Inspired by our exhibition *Embellish Me*, Miami-based artist Aurora Molina facilitated a textile workshop inspired by Miriam Schapiro's work. We also hosted a workshop based on Addie Herder's work in *Machines for Living*. These interactions were aligned with state educational standards, enhancing students' success from K-18.

### Tertulia Nights

Tertulia Nights is an after-hours experience that takes place every second Thursday of the month. This program in its second year promotes an exchange of ideas and dynamic modes of creation. It amplifies new voices, inviting local artists, scholars, and changemakers interested in engaging with the community innovatively. Since September of 2022, seven South Florida-based artists have led workshops, performances and presentations that have driven diverse audiences into our museum. We have welcomed multiple well-known and emerging local artists, writers, scholars, and musicians throughout the year exploring new and innovative ways to connect to the community through artmaking

### Drawing You In

Drawing You In combines a drawing session and an exhibition tour, providing participants with an immersive experience that invites everyone to observe details, learn, and bring out their inner artist through drawing. These drawing sessions were a regular offering before the pandemic. As we return to more in person engagement, we have decided to bring this offering back. These monthly sessions welcome teachers seeking recertification points.

### New Program: Behind the Galleries

This new program is open to FIU Museum Insiders in efforts to gain more student membership and engagement at the museum. Assistant curator, Yady Rivero and museum educator, Amaris Cruz-Guerrero led a conversation in the galleries on what museum work is like. Students were able to ask questions about how they found their roles and navigate the museum world, among other things.

**Inside the Artist's Studio** focuses on High School student's artistic career pathways by providing transportation to many local art studios to meet and learn from the artist directly. In collaboration with Miami Dade County School Visual Arts Program students were able to speak with the artist at length and in their studios about the profession over a pizza lunch provided by MDCPS.

The transportation was provided by MDCPS and allowed these students to visit for the first time. The Frost opened its doors outside of regular hours to accommodate their daily visits. Transportation remained an obstacle throughout the year, augmented by the lack of bus drivers and reduced school funding. The Frost mitigated these challenges by funding 20 school buses to the museum and partnering closely with Miami Dade County Visual Arts Department (MDCPS) to target and support partner schools and the neediest schools across the city that rarely visited museums.

South Florida-based artists that participated in this program and opened their studios were Sterling Rook, Sandra Ramos, Amanda Linares, Alejandra Moros, Diana Larrea,

and Liene Bosque. The studios included Bakehouse Art Complex and Oolite Arts.

### School Art Shows at the Frost

The Frost Art Museum hosted three shows of student artworks. This year, we celebrated the second anniversary of the small works show titled *Small Works: Reviving the Classics, Neoclassicism and Realism*, which showcased student work from Miami Dade County Public Schools from 37 schools. We also hosted two graduating classes for high school seniors: Miami Arts Studio 6-12 @ Zelda Glazer: End of the Year 1st Graduating Class Show and Arthur & Polly Mays Conservatory of the Arts: End of the Year Graduating Student Show.

Bus transportation for field trips remains a barrier for schools. The Frost provides transportation for over 400 students to visit 4- 6 times yearly. Students create work inspired by the exhibitions in the classroom

### Frost Education Team

Frost Educators were invited to jury student art exhibitions organized by the Miami-Dade County Public Schools Scholastic, Scholastic FAEA (Florida Art Education Association), the K-12 Mario Diaz-Balart Congressional Student Art Competition, and Congressman Gimenez. The students selected for the Congressional Art Exhibition will display their work in Washington, D.C., for one year.

### Art Kits

The Frost Art Museum continues to distribute art materials to schools and their students. These art kits have evolved to include more teachers' resources and art supplies so that students, parents, and teachers can explore their creativity easily and inspire others. Art activity booklets developed by

education are always available at the front desk including crayons and scavenger hunts.

Art Kits are also available to older adults who regularly visit but cannot attend sessions, and the materials are dropped off at the residential homes.

### Teacher Workshops (year-round)

School bus transportation is raffled by the Frost and MDCPS to teachers who attend workshops as an incentive to organize field trips for students and advocate for art integration.

The Frost seeks to support educators in the community, and in their classrooms supporting art teachers and other subjects such as math, social science and art history.

*Thirty art teachers from over 50 schools participated. Each teacher impacts 200 students from 2nd- 5th grade.*

### Summer Teacher Workshops

#### The Art of Gratitude July 2022

Every summer Frost partners with MDCPS offer a variety of professional workshops for teachers. The Frost partners with FIU faculty and with local artists to develop specially designed workshops that support classroom teaching. This year one two-week workshops turned to the Self and focused on ways to use art to help the educator, who in turn will apply the techniques to help the students in the fall.

The past teacher workshops were developed for teachers only, but we are combining audiences making workshops more cost effective and impactful.

Teacher Resources have been re-designed with a focus group to provide much needed support to the many educators struggling with the ever-present changes in the school classroom.

The resources are inspired by exhibitions and the permanent collection at the Frost. These resources are aligned with Florida State Standards and created for

educator professional workshops which are offered 6- 8 times per year at the museum, free of cost to educators.

The resources will be uploaded to the museum website in addition to website updates.

### Summer Camps (every week for 6 weeks)

The summer months brought 300 young campers to our galleries from across the city. Many previous summer camp groups returned such as Fit Kids America, Mindful Kids, FIU Theatre Camp, Lewis Studio Arts 4Learning, and the Barnyard. Students visited our permanent collection exhibition, *Together Apart*, and engaged in tours with inquiry questions, close-looking and visual thinking exercises. They also experienced various workshops, including portrait-making and collage, inspired by Mike Kelley and Hung Liu.

New summer camps that visited the museum were Camp Gan Israel, which is a camp experience for Jewish children that promotes a love for Judaism; Miami Gardens Future Stars Summer Camp offers summer programming for children ages 5-13; and The WOW Kids Learning Center is a special education school that empowers individuals with disabilities.

## S.T.E.A.M. WORKS!

The STEAMworks program is an approach to learning that uses Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics as access points for guiding student inquiry, dialogue, and critical thinking. This unique Frost program continues to provide support to schools seeking STEAM designation. The MDCPS (Miami Dade County Public School) partnership has grown to include additional schools such as Royal Palms Elementary School, Kenwood K-8 Center, and South Miami K- 8. This year, West Hialeah Gardens Elementary School and Oak Grove Elementary School also joined us in becoming STEAM partners.

The seven schools participating in STEAMworks engaged with the Frost exhibitions and collections both virtually and in person. As the new year unfolded many schools lost their teachers to the pandemic. The Frost continues with *A Walk in the Park* sculpture park program to support public art and engineering. Frost provides transportation funding to underserved schools. In the coming year, Frost will partner with new schools at the bronze level to support their silver and gold designation.

**The Golden Lining Mural, TRATOS:** a new program with Sweetwater Elementary School Students. The newly installed mural by the artist Tratos, has provided a new STEAM connection, combining art history, environmental science, sustainability especially aligned to Florida's fourth grade social studies curriculum.

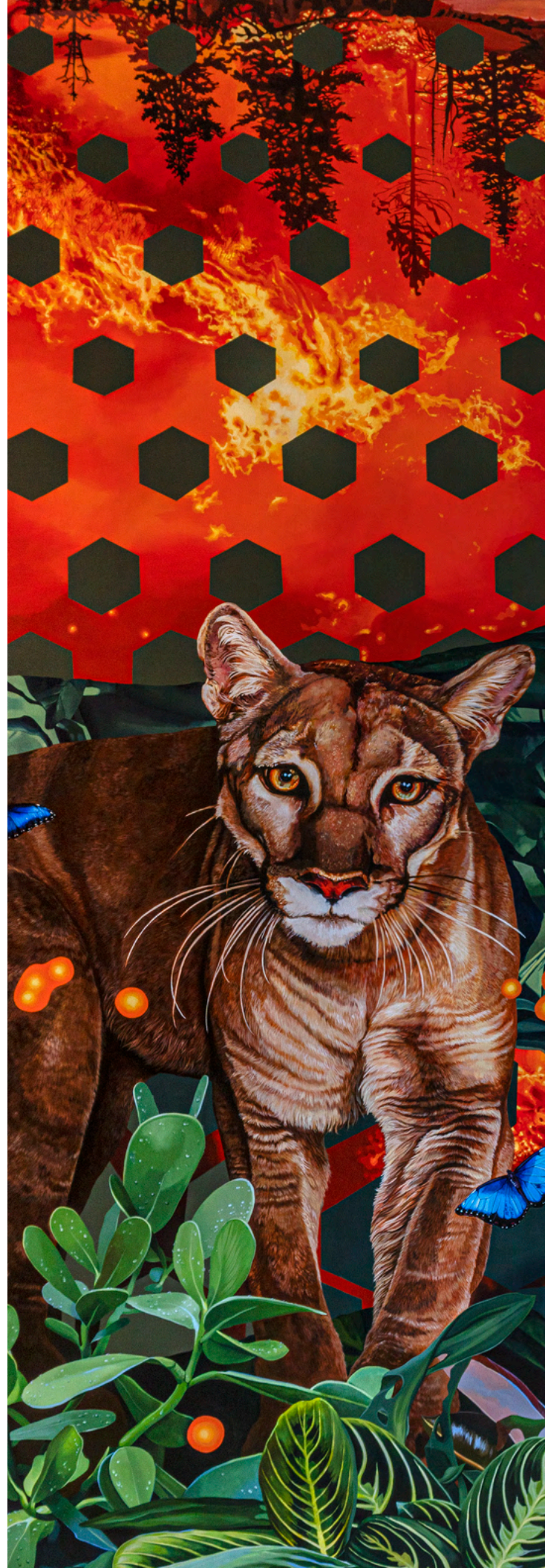
Coloring pages and activity books designed by education are available to children and visiting students.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE / MENTORSHIP

The Frost team partners with Miami Arts Studio @ Zelda Glazer, also an FIU affiliated partner. We recruited over 25 students during the school's volunteer fair to create a new teen gallery guide cohort. This group of students arrive with great enthusiasm to volunteer throughout the year and over the summer while learning about professional careers in museums. The program has grown and will expand to include a mentorship program with education.

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

## Rubin-Ladd Internships

The Rubin-Ladd internships at the Frost Art Museum are offered to two junior or senior FIU students each fall semester. Students are trained to teach with objects to expand the museum’s audience reach. During this internship, students gain experience working in museums and developing transferable skills in critical thinking, visual analysis, public speaking, educational theory, and community engagement.

Two outstanding FIU students last year, become the second cohort of paid interns at the Frost as part of the Frost Student Docent Internship supported by the Rubin Ladd Foundation. Bruna Leite De Almeida and Olivian Aradanas both worked closely with our partner schools introducing students to the art of in our permanent collection, like Hung Liu. They also worked extensively with K-12 student groups and led various hands-on projects. Finally, they engaged with FIU students and faculty with our ongoing programming.

The internship continues into its third year with two newly selected students each fall who then continue through spring. The students will teach with the Frost collections and traveling exhibitions on-site and at schools across the county.

Past interns have since graduated and have become successfully employed or selected for summer internships at other competitive institutions.

## The Ziff Internships for Curatorial Diversity (Endowed)

The Ziff Internships for Curatorial Diversity at the Frost Art Museum is offered to a junior or senior student at FIU who wishes to embark on a career in the curatorial field. Our intention is to hire a student who identifies as a person of color, but we are an equal opportunity employer, and all qualifying students are welcome to apply. This internship aims to increase the diversity of the curatorial field, helping to build the next generation of art museum professionals.

## MUSEUM RECOGNITION & PRESS

Focuses this year for the Frost Art Museum's marketing and public relations initiatives, while consistent with its goals of increasing the museum's visibility and engaging visitors, were geared towards strategically reaching new audiences. To do this, the marketing team expanded its scope by adding web development capabilities it previously did not have in addition to its routine and proven marketing tactics.

In the digital age, the Frost Art Museum recognized its gaps in delivering its community with a digital experience worth engaging with. To implement a modern, accessible, and beautiful user interface across our website, the Frost has begun a full website revamp. Public relations efforts were also met with quality media placements across top-tier national and local outlets alike.

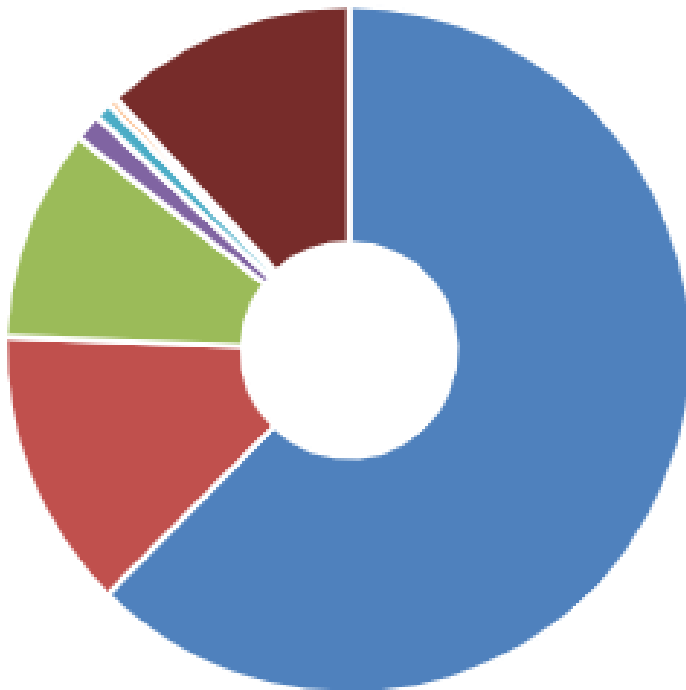
These include:

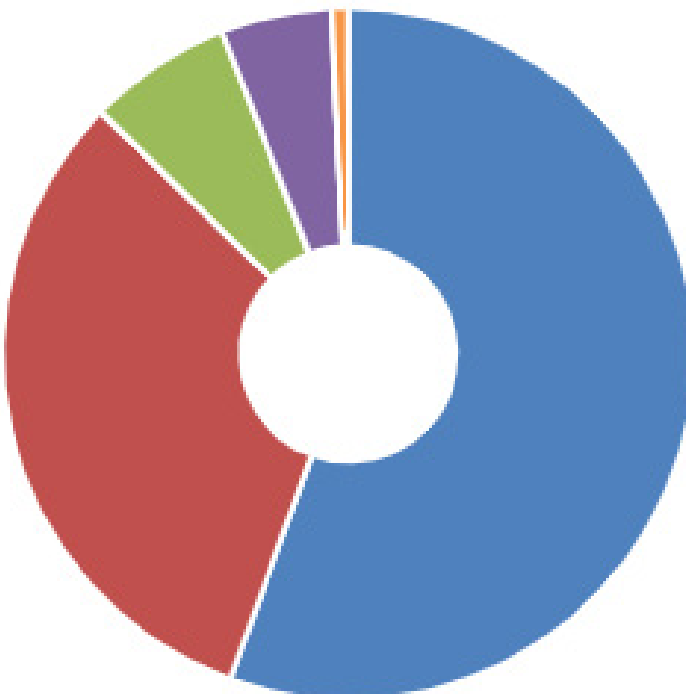

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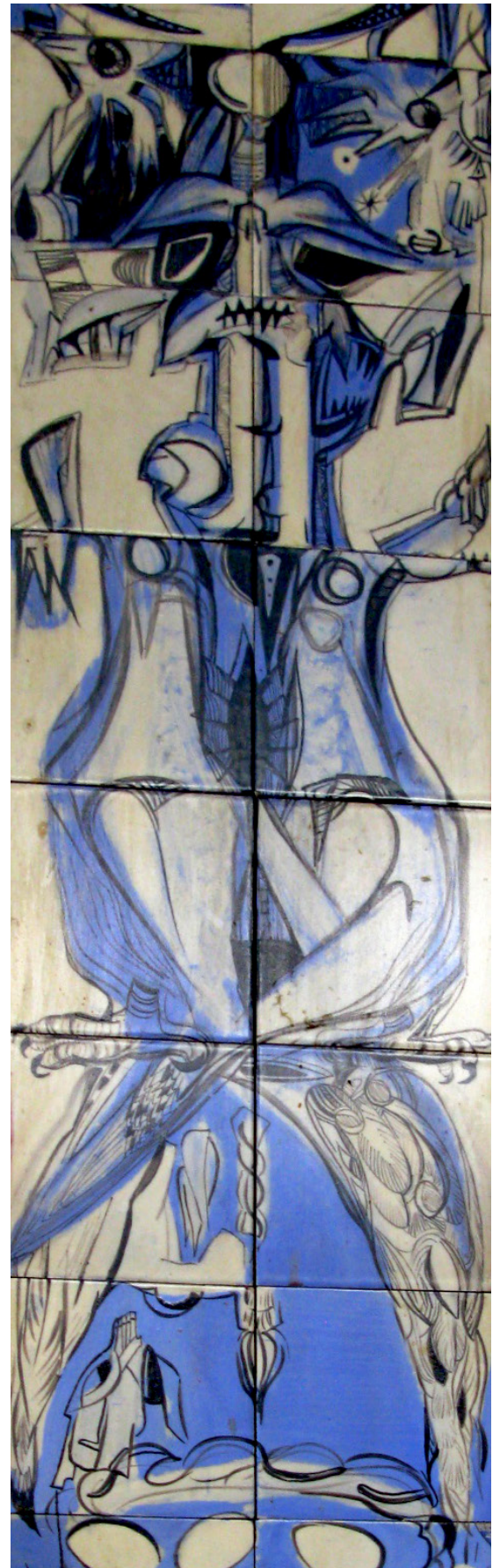
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
